Reading aloud, interactive play, and just spending time with a caring adult are all simple things babies and toddlers need so that they develop fully. Spend Time Together

WHEN YOU SPEND TIME WITH ME:

❖ I feel loved; I know that you love me.

(My brain grows and I can love you back.)

❖ I feel important to you.

(I learn that we belong together and you care about me.)

❖ I let you know how I feel and who I am.

(You understand my feelings and I understand you, too.)

How can we spend time together?

Look into my eyes and smile at me.

Talk to me about my world.

Listen to me.

Hug me often.

Eat with me.

Laugh with me.

Slow down and have 'quiet time' with me.

We can do this at meal times, while changing diapers, at the grocery store, in waiting rooms, at bedtime, and at bathtime.

Read Out Loud Together

WHEN YOU READ WITH ME:

❖ I use my brain.

(If I don't use it now, it won't grow.)

❖ I learn to say many words.

(When I understand and can use words, I get along better with you and others.)

❖ I hear your voice and feel safe.

(When I'm not afraid, I can learn and be smarter.)

How can we read together?

I like to hear your voice, even before I'm born.

Read my favorite book over and over.

Let me hold the book and turn the pages.

Let's talk about the story.

Tell me a story.

Let me tell you a story.

Show me pictures and make up the story yourself.

Let me talk while you read the story.

We can read together at the library, the literacy center, in the car or bus, in waiting rooms, and at bedtime.

❖ I learn to follow.

❖ I learn to lead.

(I am free to imagine and share new ideas.)

❖ I learn to solve problems.

(When we figure things out together, I have fun and want to learn more.)

How can we play together?

Get on the floor and let me pick the game and make the rules.

Let's go outdoors and explore the world.

Let's sing and dance.

Let's find things in the house and build things.

Let's pretend and play 'make believe.'

Let's take things apart and put them back together.

We can play at parks, on playgrounds, in play groups, outside, and inside.
